ABOUT THE PROJECT

Rewilding means looking after and creating new wild green spaces so that birds, bees, bugs and small wildlife can be restored.

This starter kit is all about wildflowers and Wild Bees. When you think about bees it's probably a Honey or Bumble bee but there are hundreds of other species.

These bees are called Solitary or Wild Bees and they don't live in hives, make honey or wax but they are amazing pollinators! It takes 120 honey bees to pollinate the same amount as a single Red Mason Bee.

You and your neighbours can help increase the Wild Bee population in the borough and contribute towards the efforts to stop further extinction of any species by building them safe homes and planting wildflowers for them to feast on.

IKEA research lab Space 10 have developed beautiful homes for Wild Bees that you can simply edit online to suit your green space then use the CNC machine at The Warehouse to print your wild bee home and assemble it in the wood working area!

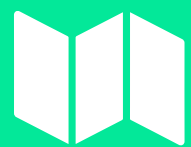

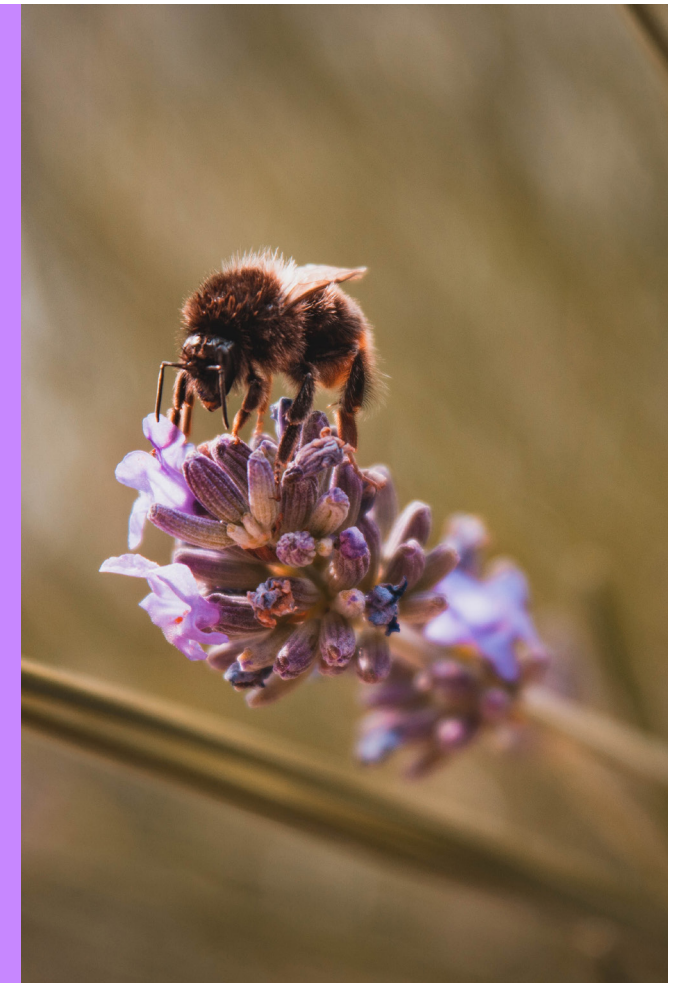

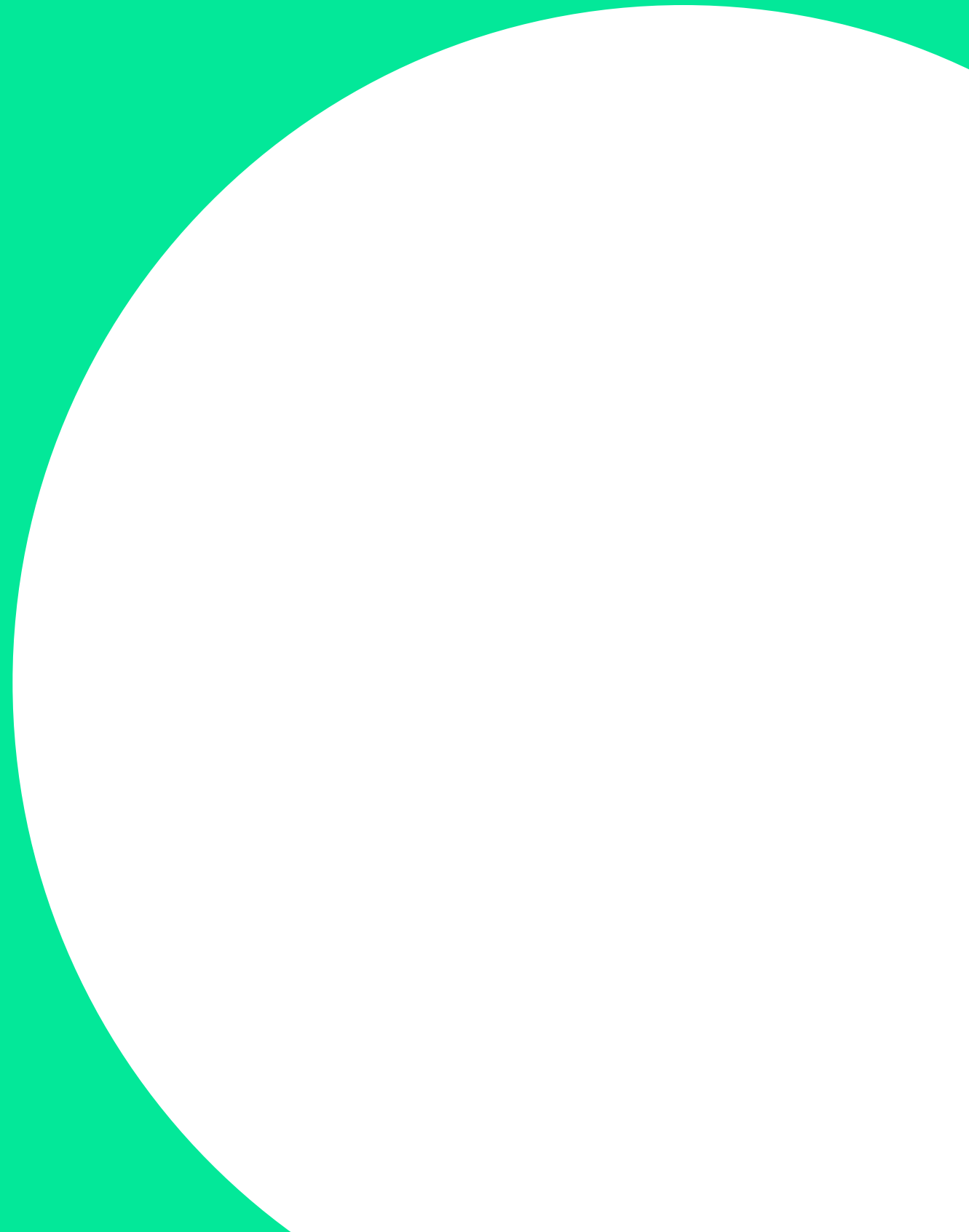

THE BIGGER PICTURE



ABOUT EVERY ONE EVERY DAY

For the past two years Every One Every Day has been working with people across the borough, joining together to share skills, start projects and make friends. Residents have been pouring their creativity and energy into these projects, ranging from cooking, making, sewing, playing, growing, sharing, composting, film and writing.

WHAT IS EVERY ONE EVERY DAY ABOUT?

There are five high street shops around the borough and one large public makerspace called The Warehouse in Thames.

People pop in to have a cup of tea and share their project or collaborative business idea and then work with the design team.

Over the last two years the project has grown a large enthusiastic network of over 6000 local people, who are doing practical things together to make everyday life better for everyone.

So far more than 150 neighbourhood projects have started with lots of local people participating, with as much or as little support as needed, including cooking, beekeeping, growing, making, repairing and much more.

Many small things done by many people really add up, and really do make friendly, healthy and happy neighbourhoods.

Lots of wonderful things are being achieved by local people, families, friends and neighbours!

HOW DOES EVERY ONE EVERY DAY WORK?

Practical hands on ideas – not lots of meetings Every One Every Day builds on the ‘hands on’ projects that people have been creating over the last few years in their own neighbourhoods. These types of projects welcome people from all walks of life.

These projects include:

- Sharing skills, spaces and resources.
- Families working and playing together.
- Batch cooking and community meals.
- Food growing and tree planting.
- Trading, making and repairing.

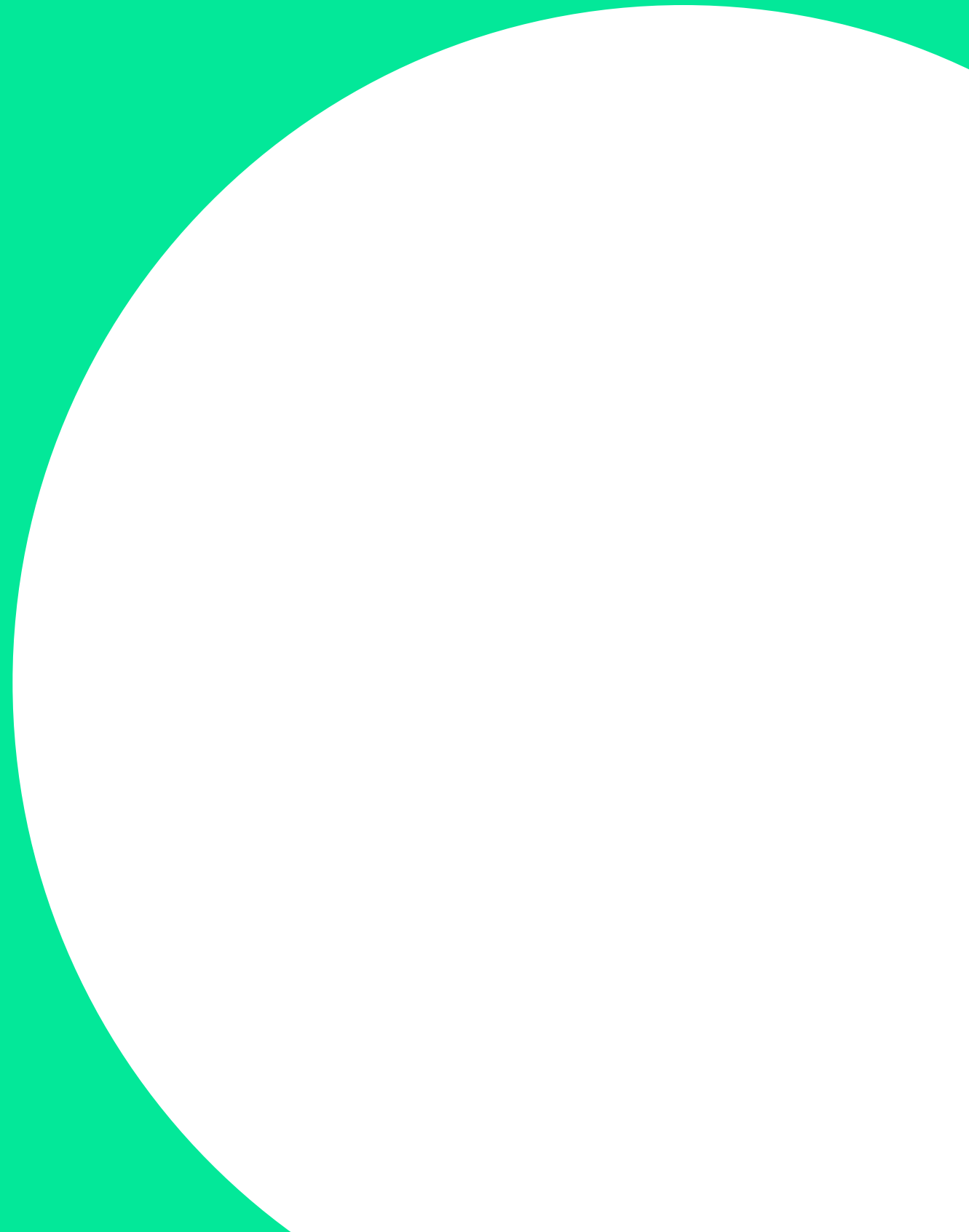

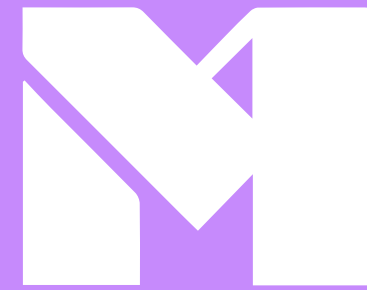


DIGITAL TOOLS

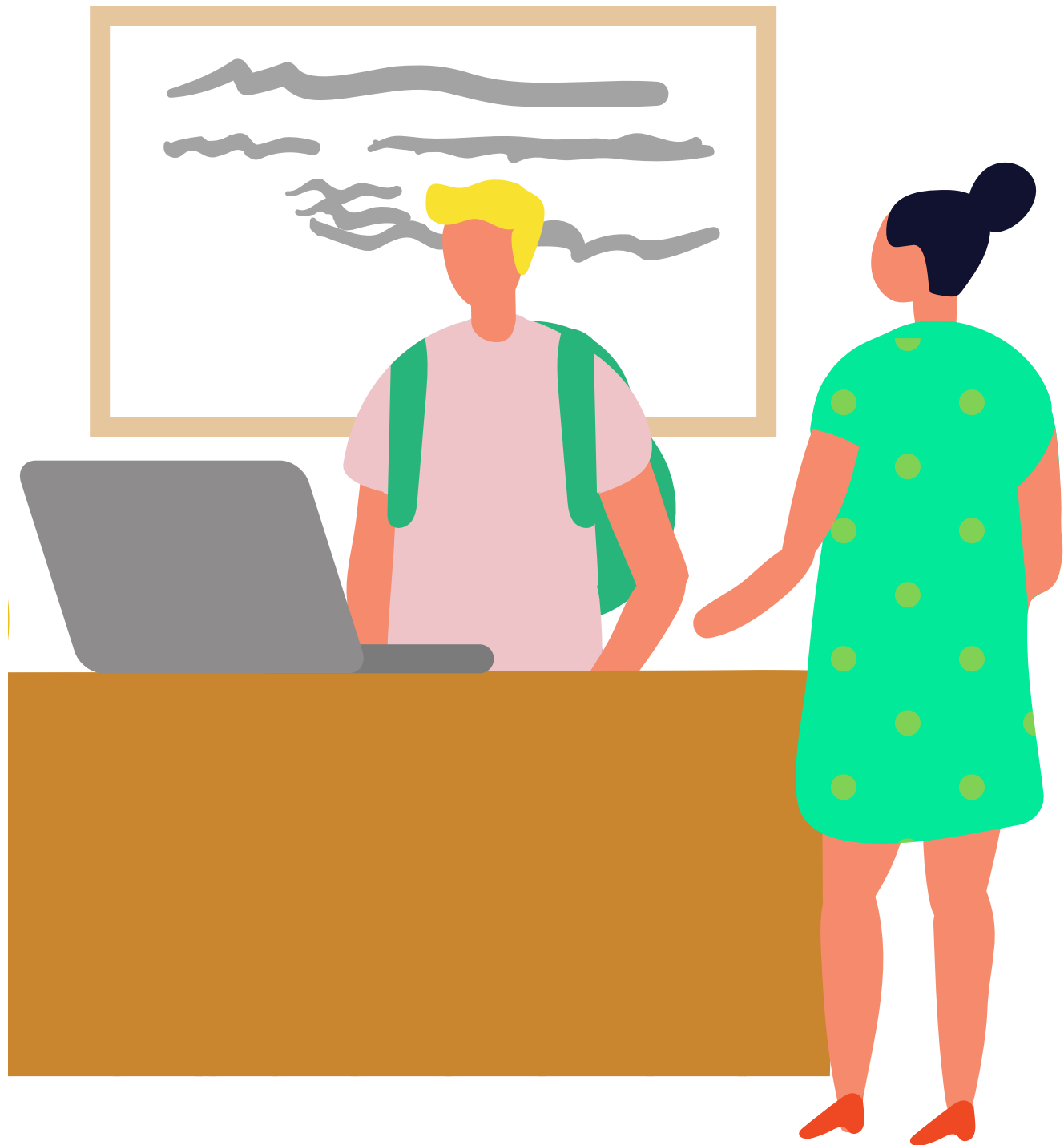


MURAL

RESEARCH

SHARE THE STORY OF YOUR STREET



BECOMING A MEMBER OF EVERY ONE EVERY DAY

As your Tomorrow Today Street grows and more of your neighbours become involved, it's important that they become members of Every One Every Day so they are covered by the insurance policy and can take part in the programmes evaluation. A simple online digital sign up form has been created for you to share at sessions.

INTERESTING RESEARCH ROLES

Research isn't just about writing notes and recording numbers. You and your neighbours can take on different roles to keep track of your project and showcase all the amazing work you'll be doing together. The Photographer, The Counter, The Maker and The Writer are all roles for people to find creative ways to tell your streets story.

Every One Every Day is a research project exploring what support, resources and ideas make it easier for neighbours to meet one another, share skills and start projects.

It would be great to know how this project goes. Remember to take photos of the beautiful wildflowers, and of people planting together. Throughout the project, keep track of the following bits of information so that we know how many people across the borough are getting involved.

- Number of seedbombs made.
- Number of sessions and get togethers.
- Anything else exciting that happens.
- Pictures of bees.
- How many bee homes were placed.

EVERY ONE EVERY DAY PRIVACY POLICY

Download and share the privacy policy with neighbours taking part in sessions so they know exactly how their information will be used.

HEALTH & SAFETY

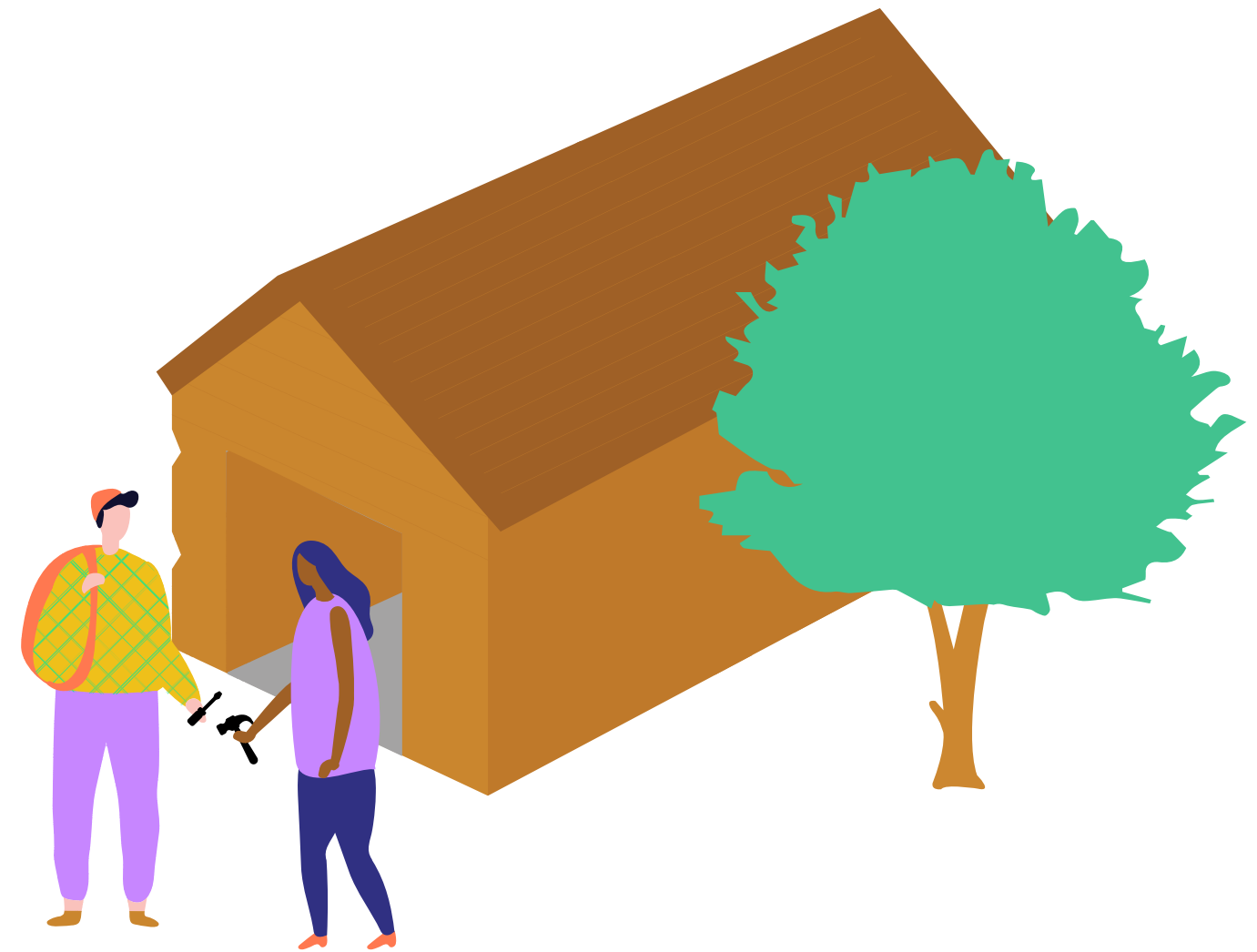
To ensure the safety of everyone, we ask that residents running the Rewilding Project take part in certain forms of training prior to the event. This is to align to our insurance policy - just incase!

TRAINING REQUIRED:

First - Aid training
Health and Safety training

There are also some simple things to bear in mind when doing assembling and checking your bee home. Remember these tips and share with others taking part in any activities:

If there is any other training you think you will need let your Street Mentor know as relevant training can be provided.



CHECK FOR BEE ALLERGY

Ask if anyone taking part is allergic to bee stings, have a mobile phone on standby in case of emergencies.

HAND WASHING

Getting hands on with planting is all part of the experience, but there are a few things that live in soil that can make you ill if they get into your mouth or into open cuts. Wearing gloves is the best way to make sure you don't get anything into open cuts. Make sure that everyone washes their hands after planting, even if they've been wearing gloves.

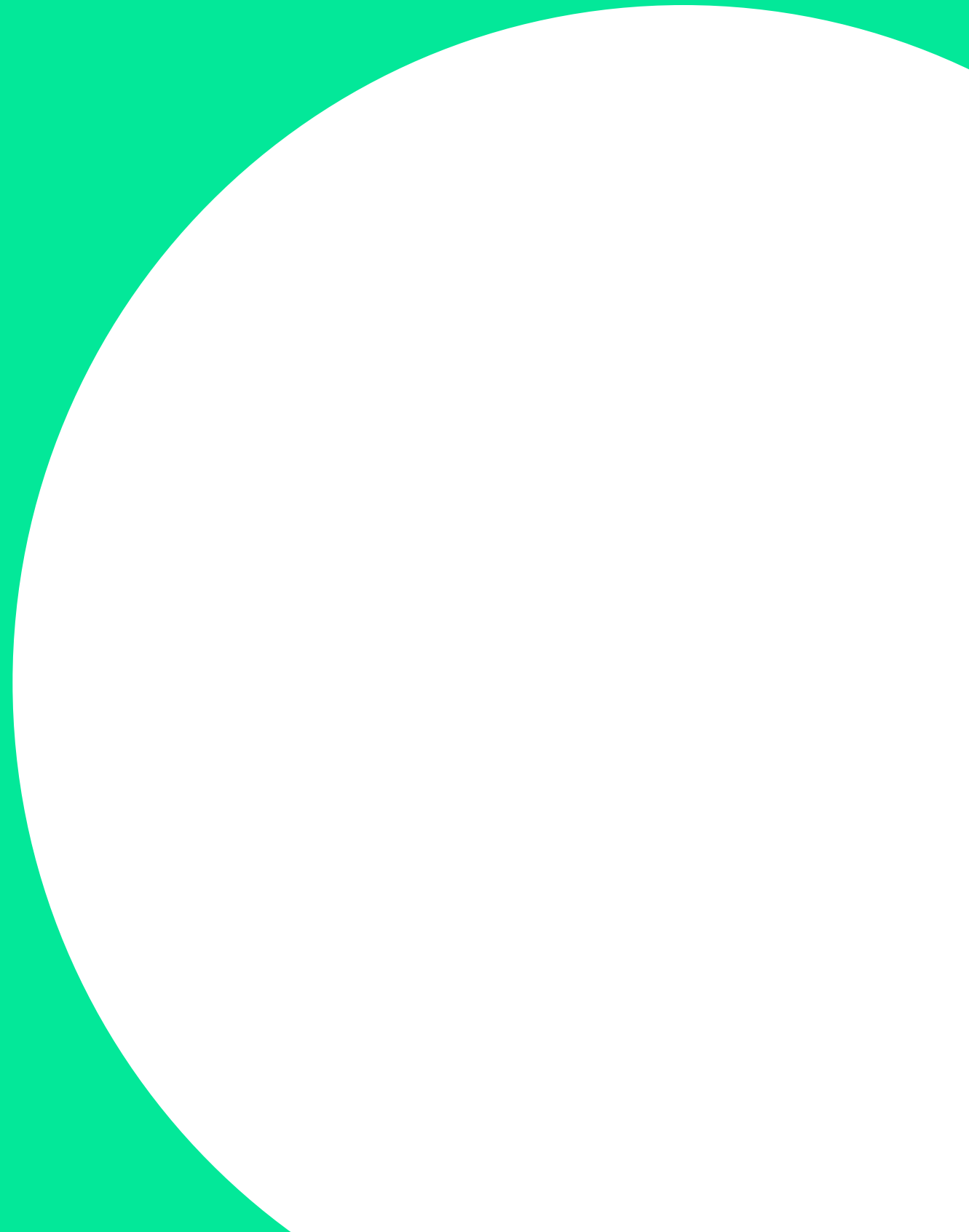
WATCH YOUR BACK!

Tending to plants can mean lots of bending over and plenty of kneeling which can take its toll. Even when you're not picking up anything heavy, it's best to make sure your back is straight and bend your knees to get down to ground level. One great tip is to take something soft to kneel on. Not only does this also save your knees, it reminds you to get down to the ground and save your back.

USING THE CNC MACHINE

For using the CNC machine we require that you and others that are interested have a full induction into the Warehouse.

GETTING NEIGHBOURS INVOLVED



ROLES IN YOUR STREET

Tomorrow Today Street projects include a variety of roles that allows different people on your street to get involved in ways that best match their individual interests, skills and abilities. Here are some examples of roles that you might need for your street.

TEA MAKER

You will have the very important role of spreading positivity and putting smiles on faces by making and sharing warm beverages as everyone joins in with activities, sessions and games.

MEETER & GREETER

Help your neighbours feel welcomed as they show interest and join in with your project.

PHOTOGRAPHER

As the photographer, your role will be to capture memories and moments that shows your street as you take part in projects together. Ideas: how neighbours make decisions, how ideas grow and how much fun you have and what you learn during projects.



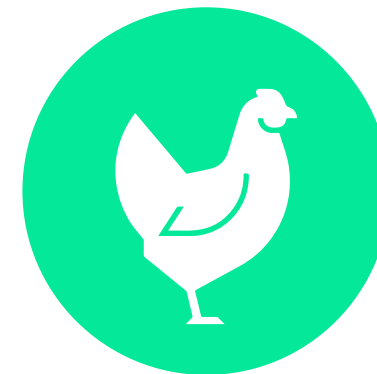

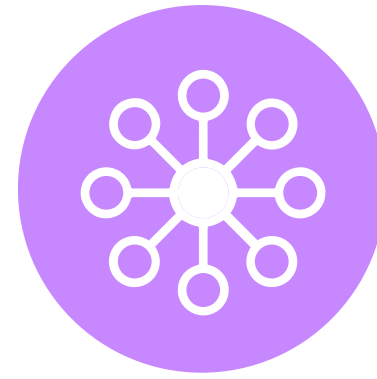

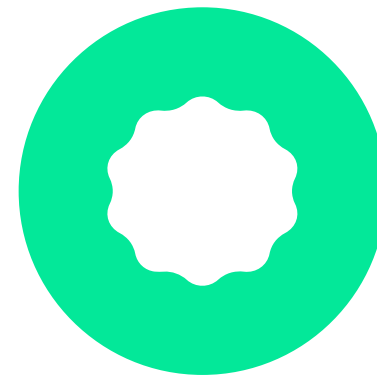

HOW TO COMMUNICATE

There are as many ways to communicate as there are ways to help each other out! For your group conversations, you can use a WhatsApp or Facebook group that everyone can join to stay up to date.

People over the world have different ways to talk to their neighbours, from putting up a note on their windows to writing nice messages on post-it notes... let your imagination fly!

A phone call to check in, a chat over the fence or on the street are also all good ways to share some neighbourliness.

For the less tech savvy amongst the group, these add a personal touch that all the other formats may not, so don't underestimate how far a text can go!

There are loads of ways to get neighbours involved, and a simple conversation is usually a good way to get things going. If there are neighbours you know that have children around a similar age, a knock on the door and a quick chat never goes a miss .

You can also put one or several posters up on your street to describe what the project is about and how your neighbours can get involved.



WHATSAPP

Whatsapp groups have become very popular because they allow people to send and receive messages, pictures, videos and voice notes.

Your Street Mentor can help you moderate your group if you need or give you advice on how to manage the group.

LEAFLETS, POSTERS & NEWSPAPERS

Posting leaflets through doors, and putting posters in the area helps inform those who you may not reach through door knocking.

You can leaflet to get people involved in your Tomorrow Today Street or inform them of an upcoming event.

FACEBOOK

You may want to create a private Facebook page, it's a popular way people can share videos, photos and plan! It's also a good way to create events and keep track of those coming along to sessions.

It's also a great way to save memory on your phones and computers by keeping it all online.

NEXT DOOR APP

The app is localised, so people living on nearby streets can recommend message each other, reach out for support or invite people to events.

GETTING OTHER PEOPLE INVOLVED

Don't forget that some of your neighbours might not be online so phone calls and chats over the fence or on the streets are also a good way to communicate and get people thinking about the future together.

It's really useful to have a way of staying in touch with everyone who's involved. Some people may want to be super involved, and others may want to help out for a little and take a pause, whatever the circumstance, you'll need to have an easy way to talk to each other.

BUDDY UP

There may be some people that aren't online, or have access to the internet that you've spoken to about the project. To keep them in the loop, buddy that person up with someone who preferably lives nearby who can hand deliver the message, or give them a ring about important changes, meetings and fun goings-on.



MEETINGS

It's very easy for meetings to become a bit tiresome! But by asking everyone at the beginning if they need any time from the meeting to think things through, give an update, come up with ideas together, try to gather this at the start and allocate time for each individual request. You'll soon see that you've created an entire meeting content together!

Planning and attending meetings can be a bit tiring. So it's best if meetings are kept to a minimum. However, if you would like to meet with your team, it's best if everyone has a chance to share. You could message people beforehand to find out what questions they have or do this together at the beginning of the meeting. You'll soon see that you've created an entire meeting content together!

PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS

These bright and colourful leaflets and posters will help you get your neighbours excited and let them know their road is about to become a Tomorrow Today Street!

INDOOR & OUTDOOR POSTERS

Waterproof and regular posters to catch your neighbours eye as they walk by. Pick a lamp post that gets a lot of traffic!

LEAFLETS

Pop these leaflets through your neighbours door.

NEWSPAPERS

Once you and two of your neighbours have started, you will be sent 30-50 newspapers to get even more people involved. The newspapers contain a breakdown of all 24 projects and all the introduction information.

CONTACT CARDS

A small card for you to write your name, email or phone number so your neighbours can get in touch to find out more.

OTHER MATERIALS

Posters, leaflets and social media are the best way to promote your event, you can place them on your street, at nearby cafes, communities spaces (such as libraries) and your front window.

It gives you the material to show people on your street the amazing things they can do and get involved in.

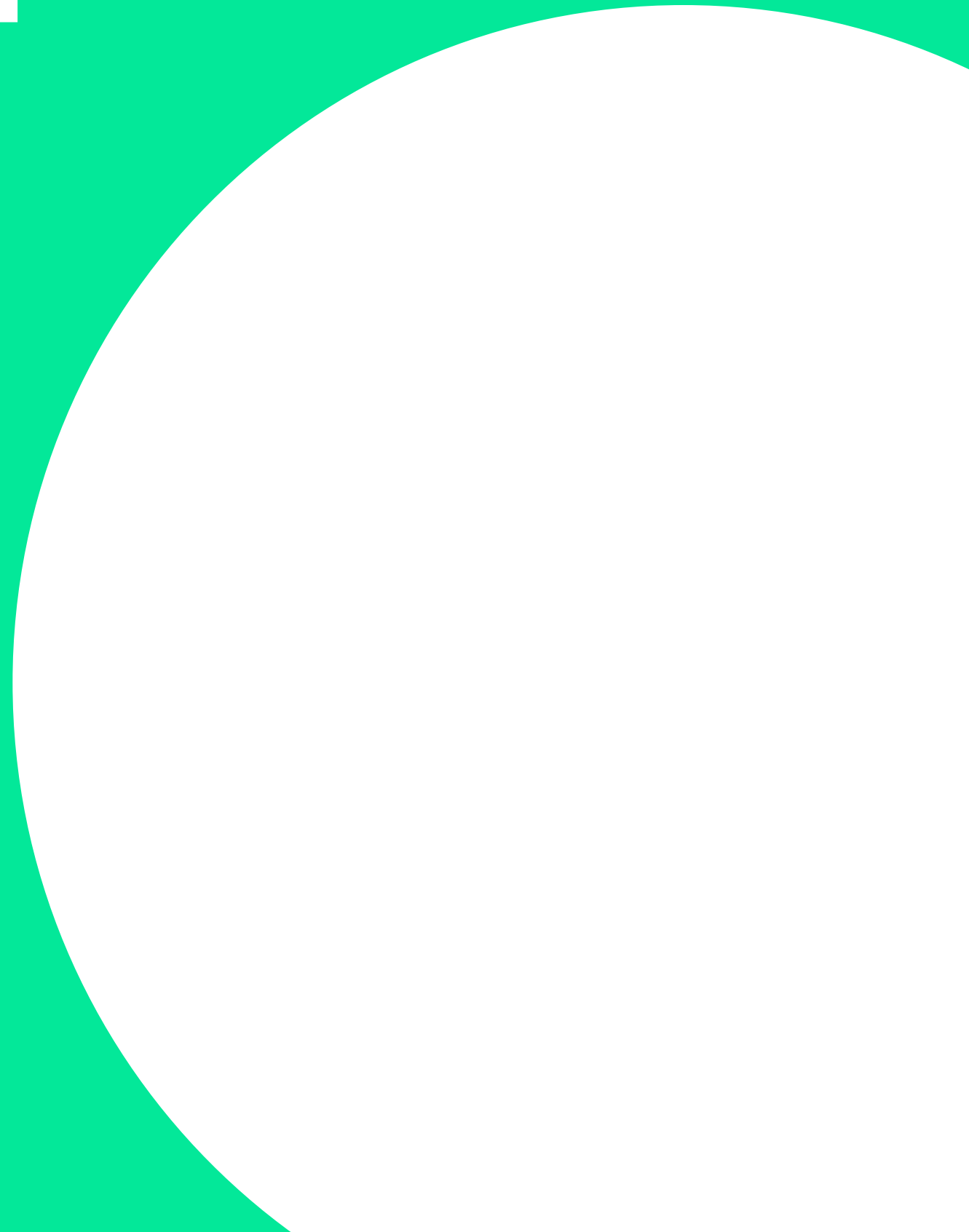
Our Every One Every Day shops will be more than happy to promote your event with posters and leaflets.

HOW WILL THIS WORK ON STREET



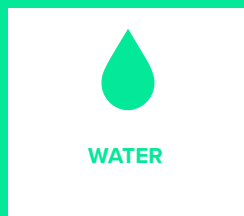
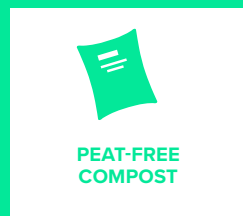
SEED BOMB WILD WALK

Why not make an afternoon of it? Set up some tables on the street, in a garden or front room and get your hands messy making seed bombs. You and your neighbours can then take a walk, looking for the perfect spot to throw and grow!

HOW TO MAKE YOUR SEED BOMB

- Grab a bowl and mix together 1 cup of seeds with 2 cups of clay powder and 5 cups of compost.
- Gently mix in water with your hands (don't be afraid to get a little messy) until everything sticks together.
- Roll the mixture between your palms into firm balls.
- Leave them to dry in a sunny place!
- Now it's the fun part! Grab your neighbours, head outside and plant your seed bombs by throwing them at empty green patches, pour some water on top and keep coming back to see what grows.

WHAT YOU NEED



PLANTING WILDFLOWERS

Wildflowers are a fantastic way of rewilding your garden, a green space or park. It's a very simple way to support the local wildflower and have a green space looking colourful in no time!

INSTRUCTIONS

1 CHOOSE A BARE PATCH OF SOIL AND GIVE IT A LIGHT TO MEDIUM WATER.

2 GRAB A SMALL HANDFUL AND SCATTER THE SEEDS THINLY IN ROWS.

3 COVER THEM SLIGHTLY WITH SOIL AND WAIT!
THEY WILL BEGIN TO GERMINATE AND GROW WITH NO MAINTENANCE IN THE SPRING MONTHS!



THE LIFE OF SOLITARY BEES

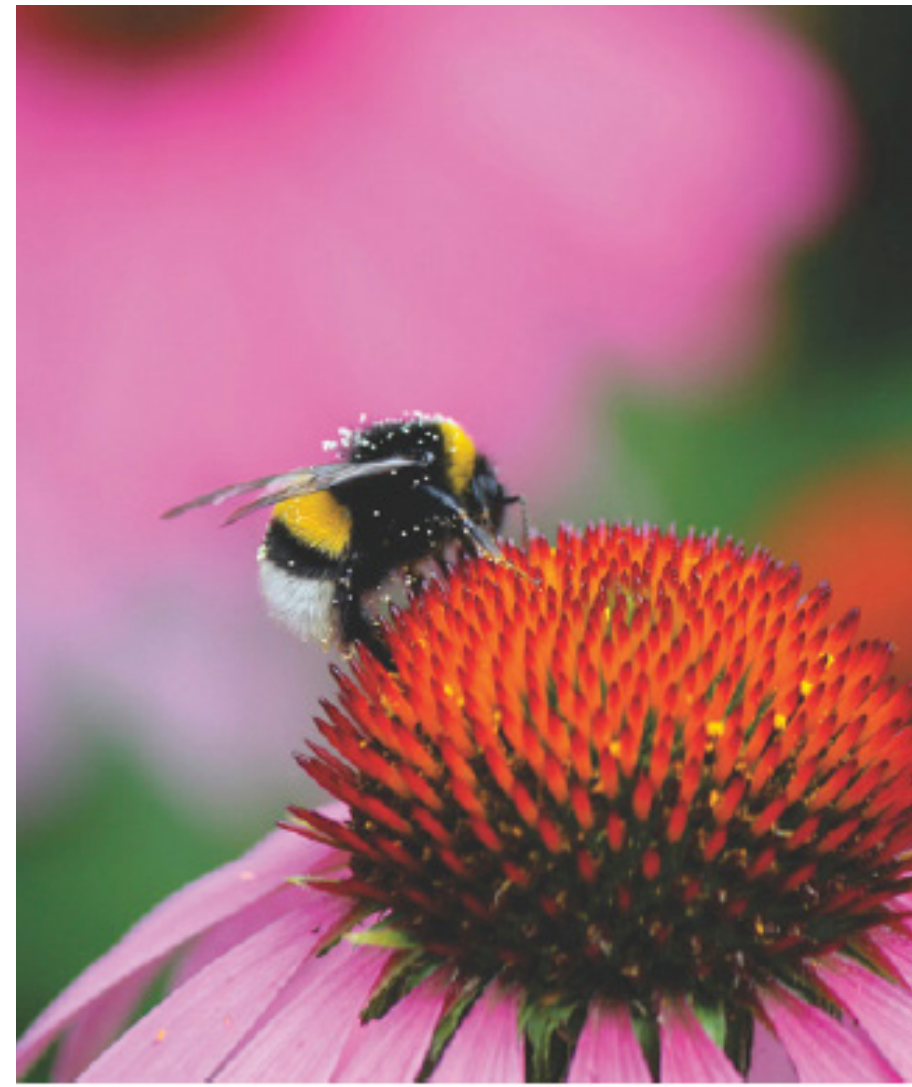
After bees mate, the female will look for a hole to place her eggs, if you're lucky many will choose your bee home.

Every single egg is separated by nectar and pollen, the bees are busy flying, gathering pollen and helping plants with pollination.

Once the nectar and pollen has been placed, the female bee will fill the hole with mud repeating the process for her other

eggs until the length of the hole is full and she will finally seal it shut.

In the spring, the mature bees will emerge from the tubes. The females emerge after males because the eggs are placed deeper in the tubes. This is done to protect the population by making sure there is a strong female population to help keep the species going.



FIVE FUN FACTS ABOUT SOLITARY BEES

1

Not aggressive so they don't swarm, rarely sting and are great around children and pets.

2

They don't have pollen baskets like honey and Bumble Bees so each time they drink from a plant they drop a lot of pollen.

Making them great pollinators.

4

A single Red Masonry Bee is equivalent to 120 worker honeybees in terms of pollination!

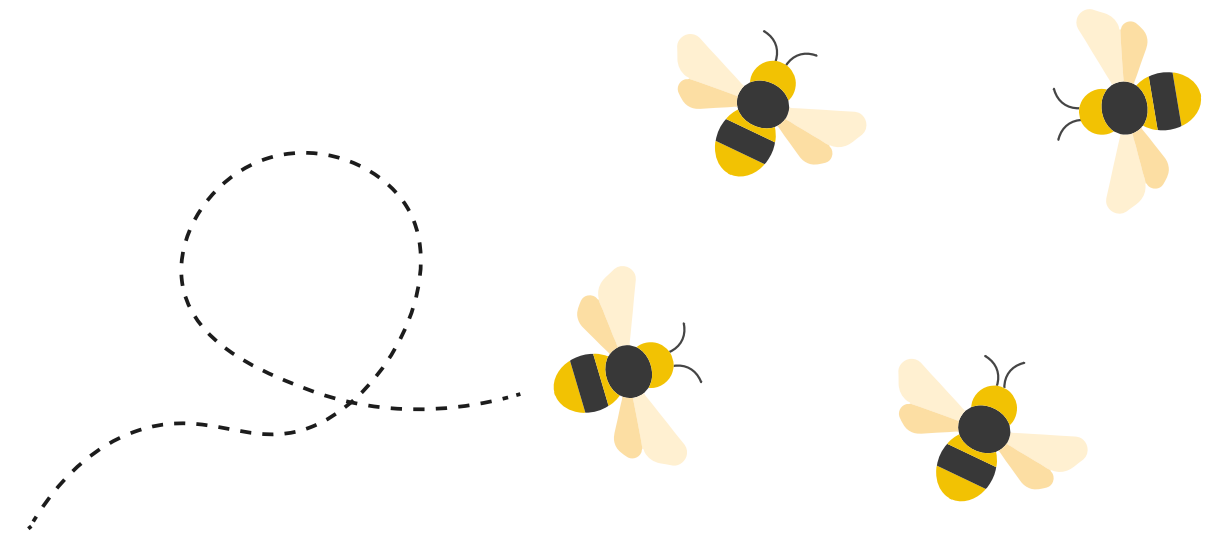

They do not produce wax to build their cells instead forage for different materials - which means it's easy for us to help them build a home.

WHEN TO SET UP YOUR BEE HOME

From spring through summer, different species of bee will hopefully build cells inside and lay eggs. Once the winter months hit, you'll need to protect the home by moving it indoors carefully from October to

February. You can place this in a shed, or a shoe box somewhere dry and safe ready to go outside again in March.



CHOOSING THE RIGHT BEE HOME

The most important factors to think about when placing your bee home is the wind and the sun.

- Choose a location protected from high winds.
- Make sure it has south or southwest exposure to make sure the bees get the brightest sun during the winter period.
- Place your bee home against a flat surface.
- Insert it firmly into the ground making sure the base of the home is a meter off the ground.
- Plant your wildflower seeds around the bee home and water them, ready to grow and attract bees.
- Make sure there is nothing covering the holes, so bees can enter easily.

HOW TO ATTRACT SOLITARY BEES

- Put out some water for them to drink! Collecting pollen is thirsty work so to help partly filling a shallow dish with water adding 5-8 medium size rocks for the bees to stand on whilst they drink.
- Place your bee home amongst other flowers such as lavenders, daisies, grevilleas and salvias.

CHECKING YOUR BEE HOME

You've done the hard part, now you will want to check your bee home every week or so to make sure it's in good condition to check if you can spot signs that someone has moved in! A bee home should always be looked after.

- Check your bee home weekly during the spring and summer months.
- Record the date each hole is filled, closed and opened.
- Taking photographs of the capped holes and any bees you see!
- Check for insects.

TYPES OF SOLITARY BEES

RED MASON BEES

Red Mason Bees have red and ginger hair and the females have small horns on their heads. They can be found throughout the UK and get their name from their love of nesting in holes in brickwork but will happily make a handmade wild beehive their home!

WHERE CAN I FIND THEM?

You are most likely to find these bees in urban environments, especially in the areas of gardens and parks with bright flowers and trees.

WHEN WILL I BE ABLE TO SEE THEM?

Between late March and July you have the highest chance of spotting these fuzzy beauties - so make sure you're checking your hive regularly during these times.

WHAT KIND OF PLANTS/SHRUBS DO THEY LIKE?

These red heads love garden plants, spring flowering shrubs and trees, especially apples and pears.

MALE VS FEMALE

The male are skinnier with long antennae whereas the females have broader black heads and big bodies.



LEAFCUTTER BEE

There are seven species of Leafcutter Bee in the UK, they are dark brown and covered in lighter brown or yellow hair with broad heads and large mandibles. They use these mandibles to cut holes in leaves and glue them together using saliva to build the cells their larvae in.

WHERE CAN I FIND THEM?

You can find these bees in a variety of habitats, ranging from farms, woodlands, grassy areas, towns and gardens.

WHAT KIND OF PLANTS/SHRUBS DO THEY LIKE?

Leaves, leaves and leaves - especially roses!

WHEN WILL I BE ABLE TO SEE THEM?

Between April and August you have the highest chance of spotting these fuzzy beauties - so make sure you're checking your hive regularly during these times.



CARPENTER BEE

These robust bees can be mistaken for Bumble Bees due to the broadness of their bodies. They have hairless, shiny black abdomens and some species may be green, or purplish in color. They get their name from the habit of boring holes into wood to lay their eggs.

WHERE CAN I FIND THEM?

You can find these drillers anywhere there is wood outdoors, fence posts, window frames, soffits or decks. Keep an eye out for nearly perfect holes approximately 1/2 inch in diameter. You will see round holes and a coarse sawdust-like substance called frass underneath the holes. Old nests can be used year after year by the carpenter bees so if you and decide to place your wild beehive next to old holes in the chance they'll yours instead!

WHEN WILL I BE ABLE TO SEE THEM?

Between late April and July you have the highest chance of spotting these fuzzy beauties - so make sure you're checking your hive regularly during these times.

WHAT KIND OF PLANTS/SHRUBS DO THEY LIKE?

These bees enjoy pollen and nectar from almost any flowering plant or shrub, due to their size they struggle to get nectar from plants without cutting them open from the side!

MALE VS FEMALE

The male has a yellow face with a white dot on their heads whereas the females face is black.



MINING BEE

There are 65 species of Mining Bees in the UK, making them the largest genus! They range in size from 5-17mm. They get their names from the habit of digging nests in soil. They are easily spotted by the grooves (facial fovea) running down the inside of their eyes which is essentially unique in Britain. Due to the large number of species some of these features will differ. You can find more detailed images and descriptions on the Wildlife Trust website.

WHERE CAN I FIND THEM?

You can find these beauties across the UK in lawns and flowerbeds in gardens and parks, or in mown banks and edges of orchards.

WHEN WILL I BE ABLE TO SEE THEM?

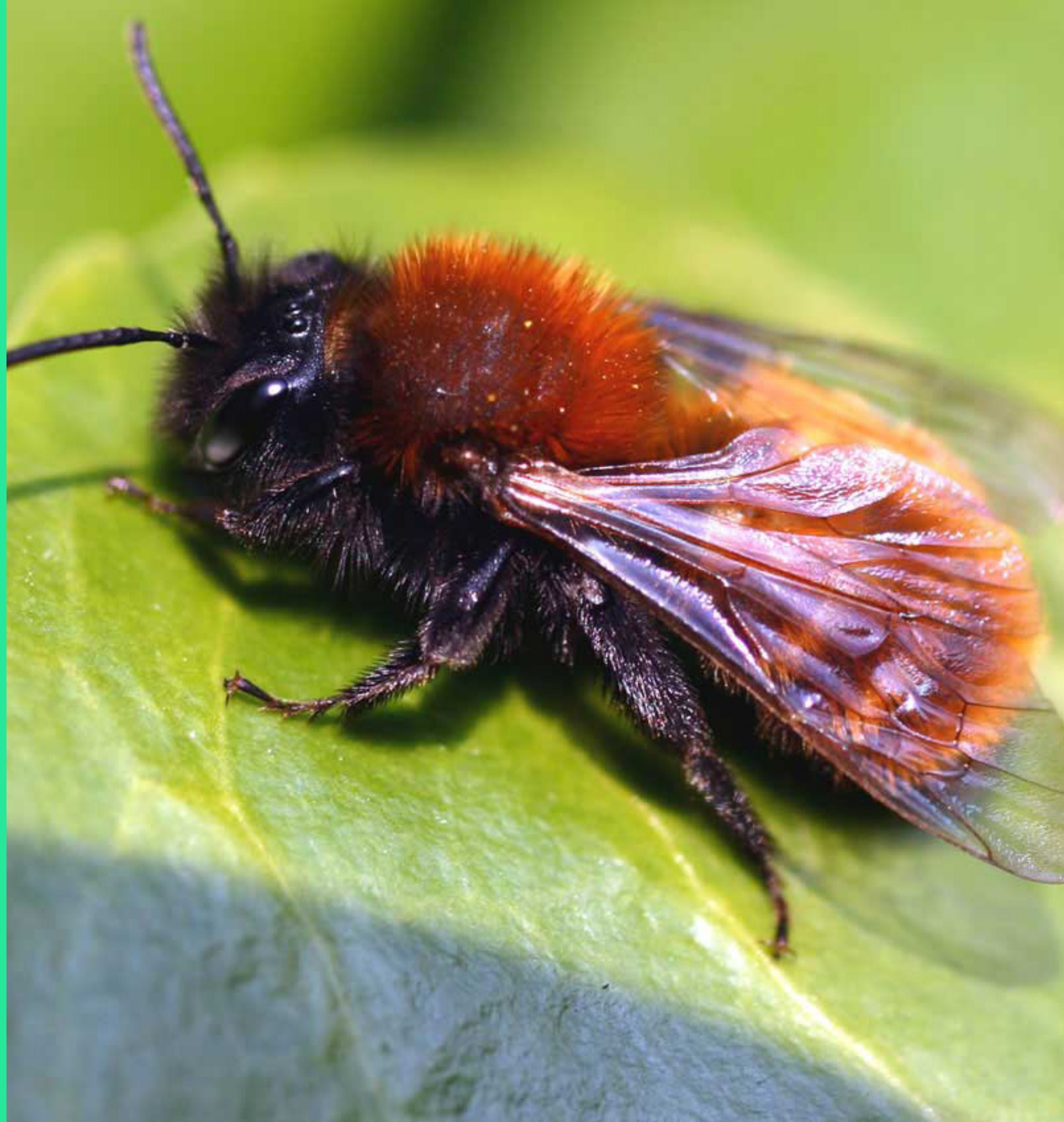

MAKE A HOME FOR WILDLIFE

Small insects, bugs, birds and bees need natural green spaces to find food, build homes and nurture their young - let's support them to support us.

EXPLORE YOUR LOCAL AREA

Discover new places to walk, run, jog, meet, have picnics, spot birds, insects and appreciate nature in full bloom.

IMPROVE YOUR HEALTH

Studies show that spending just two hours a week in nature can improve our health and wellbeing, join in and feel the physical benefits.



MAKE YOUR STREETS BEAUTIFUL

Take ownership of your local streets through the power of planting! Plant in window boxes, hanging baskets, raised beds and even look after bees! Create a beautiful place to be proud of.
